Exciting News! Basement Project Completed

The former Lake Placid train station, our Museum, was built ca. 1908 as documented on a carved shingle on the

west side gable end. Ground water has been trickling into the basement ever since, requiring the need for two sump pumps, one running constantly and the other for backup. The water in the basement caused high humidity and conditions that required heat in the winter to keep the pumps going and the water from freezing. The oil burning heating system had rusted, was inefficient, and expensive to run. Last winter the pumps shut down due to loss of heat during the worst of the cold

weather. The water level rose in the basement above the floor and froze. We had to run a propane fueled torpedo heater in front of the door for 8 hours to thaw the ice. We were able to pry the door open and bang away at the ice with a long pick until we could force our way into the basement. The Lake Placid Water

Department spent hours at the Museum pumping out water. This scenario has happened more than once! This fall, with a generous bequest from Lorraine Bryant, a gift from the Adirondack Foundation

SUN Fund, and targeted donations from our members we have finally remedied the situation.



Completed basement project

Don Murray's Basement Systems, recommended by Wiley Lavigne, filled most of the basement with 140 tons of sand creating a crawl space with 4' of headroom. Two new pumps were installed in a gravel enclosed pit in the sand. Drainage tile was run around the perimeter of the space just below the surface. Murray's waterproofed and sealed the entire area with polyethylene sheeting finally a dehumidifier was added to dry up any remaining moisture.

The antiquated heating system and oil tank were removed and Hurley Brothers has upgraded the heating system to new propane powered warm air enabling us to control the heat in four zones of the Museum.

Thank you to the Lorraine Bryant bequest and the Adirondack Foundation Sudden and Urgent Needs Fund and our members who responded to our basement appeal.


Museum/Gallery News

2019 Project Supporters-

Thank you to all our donors this year! We have accomplished all these projects with their generous support.

<u>Stewart's Holiday Match Grant:</u> In the fall of 2018 the Lake Placid 8th graders visited the Museum and gave us feedback on improvements and updates they would like to see. One of the most common suggestion was to develop an audio guide in the Mary McKenzie Gallery. A grant from the Stewart's Holiday Match provided us the funding for this project. The audio guide will be installed next spring!

Town of North Elba: General operating support.

Essex County Cultural Assistant Program: Exhibit upgrades.

THE FREIGHT HOUSE HAS A NEW ROOF! -

The 1990 era Freight House has a new roof. The worn out splitting shingles have been replaced and the sagging eaves have been straightened. The Buildings and Grounds Committee members supervised and helped with the project. Committee member Mike Mahoney particularly helped on his area of expertise, structural integrity, advising on the support of

the drooping eaves. The existing eave supports were not adequate for the weight of the deep overhangs. The supports were beefed up with 2"x6" 's.

Over the years the fascia had rotted in many locations. It was removed and replaced with new 2"x6" facings. As the fascia was applied the line of the eaves was straightened and braced by the new fascia.

K & G then removed the old shingles and repaired the roof deck where it had rotted and was leaking into the collection storage area. (Don't worry, many tarps had been spread out during the years. However, the new roof is a big improvement on plastic sheeting!) An Ice and Water Shield was run around the edge of the roof and Owens Corning Duration architectural grade shingles completed the job.
