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

2023 has been an exciting year for everyone at the Lake Placid-North Elba Historical Society. President Parmelee Tolkan led the museum for the past eight years and has turned over the reins to us. It will take two of us to begin to fill her shoes. Thank you Parm! We cannot say this enough.

The Historical Society programs are well positioned because of Parmelee's hard work, vision and her ability to put together an excellent Board of Directors. Each member of the Board will have a role to play as we implement the "action plans" identified in the newly minted 2023 Strategic Plan. Board Member, Peter Roland, spearheaded the process of updating the 2016 plan. We hired A.D. Hamingson & Associates to guide us. Several projects are already in motion in response to this exercise.

First on the list are modifications inside the museum to enhance accessibility; widening the hall-way and creating an ADA compliant restroom. Thanks to a generous LEAF grant, we are moving forward with this project over the winter, led by Board Members Steve Sama and Michael Mahoney. The renovations will also create a small kitchen, office space and gift shop. In addition, the strategic plan captured ideas to improve the property surrounding the train station museum. Board member Peter Roland led negotiations to establish a Rail Trail terminus at the south end of the property. We envision additional improvements of the space to include creative community centered events and beautification of the rail yard.

And now, a big welcome to our new Director Christine "Chris" Malmgren. Chris landed in Lake Placid at the end of September and has already made huge strides forward. She is learning about the area, meeting other professionals from local cultural organizations, generating our Annual Appeal, setting up the Winter Lecture Series and creating the newsletter. She hopes to reach out to as many of our local partners and friends as possible in the coming months. The Society Welcomed New Staff in 2023

Chris Malmgren became our new director last September. Adirondack Rail Trail is Now Open from Lake Placid to Saranac Lake

After many years of planning and two years of construction, the Adirondack Rail Trail (ART) between Lake Placid and Saranac Lake opened in early November. Work on the section from Saranac Lake to Floodwood is expected to be completed in 2024, the final section to Tupper Lake in 2025. Upon completion, a spectacular 34-mile recreation path will be available to residents and visitors year round.

The northern terminus of the ART on Station Street will be on a 1.77 acre lot soon to be sold by the Historical Society and owned and maintained by the Village of Lake Placid. Developed in conjunction with the Open Space Institute (OSI), the trailhead will offer parking, rest rooms and signage including historical interpretation. Parking for snowmobiles and trailers will be provided in the snow storage lot on Old Military Road behind the Fire Station. Historical and natural history interpretation will be included in signage the entire length of the ART.

The ART represents an opportunity to tell "our story" to a greatly expanded audience of residents and visitors. Historical interpretation at the trailhead will provide some Lake Placid history and will direct users to *The History Museum* to learn more. We look forward to welcoming Adirondack Rail Trail users and fulfilling our mission to "preserve and present our community's history in ways that are educational and enriching for residents and visitors."
